Jibaba, when you are not used to him, you may term him as the most serious child at Umoja who rarely laughs. Although it's not the case if he becomes close to you, and also has trust in you. In the house, he does trust and believes in Aunt Lozi more than Aunt Agnes to the extent that even if someone among his Umoja siblings does something against his wish or beating him, he only trusts Aunt Lozi. He has trusted her to the extent that even if she is not around, he will sit and cry until he gets satisfied. Then wait for his favourite Aunt to come and report to her. For me I understand him as to why he is reacting that way. He has been seeing Aunt Lozi since he came to his Umoja and still he is seeing her and to add on that, they are sharing rooms. That is the main reason as to why he has bonded with her so much more than anyone else. To Alare (Jibaba), Aunt Lozi is the only mother he has known other than Aunt Agnes.

He is progressing well in his education. When given an assignment and he doesn't know it he doesn't hesitate to ask. He sometimes asks Jimama (Alexis) his twin sister to show him the homework. He remains attentive and follows what he is being taught. If it is Aunt Agnes who is supervising the homework, he doesn't ask her even if he doesn't know. He would prefer asking another child rather than asking her which is funny because Aunt Agnes is so kind to all the children. On my view I don't see him disliking her in any way, but it's only that he doesn't want to share his personal issue with her reason known best by him. He is also cooperative with other children when it comes to teamwork. He works tirelessly with the other children unlike previously when he used to go and sit with Aunt Lozi while his Umoja siblings are busy working. Suppose you ask him to join the rest, he may burst into tears.

He has developed a sense of manhood. He likes asking Aunt Lozi: "Why is it that I am a boy but I share room with girls. All my colleagues are sleeping in one room while Dolphin has his own room. It is only me whom I am sleeping with girls. Then from today I will shift all my belonging and I will be sleeping in the boy's room."



He takes some days sleeping in the boy's room then meekly returns to where Aunt Lozi and Jimama are sleeping. He has not fully made up his mind on where he is wants to sleep, as he still feels more comfortable having Aunt Lozi and his Jimama close to him.

He has not become sick for the whole month.

A well deserved recognition for Robert's conservation activities following in his father's footsteps.


