



Thai Banana Roti (Banana Pancakes)

makes 12 portions

INGREDIENTS:

DOUGH-

- 260ml Water
- 2tbsp Sugar (any sweetener will work)
- 1 Large Egg
- 50g Salted Butter, melted
- 500g Plain/AP Flour (And a bit more for kneading)
- Bananas (Just ripe or a bit under-ripe is perfect)
- Vegetable Oil
- Salted Butter for frying
- Condensed Milk

DOUGH:

- 1. Whisk together water, sugar, and egg in a large bowl. 2. Gradually whisk in melted butter.
- 3. Add flour and fold to form a very sticky dough.
- 4. Knead the dough for 20 minutes until smooth and less sticky.
- 5. Divide the dough into 12 balls and coat with vegetable oil. 6. Place dough balls on a plate, cover with cling film, and refrigerate for 2 hours.

ASSEMBLE:

- 1. Slice bananas into 1cm-1.5cm thick pieces.
- 2. Prep a pan with a thin layer of vegetable oil on low heat.
- 3. Flatten a cold dough ball on a lightly oiled surface.
- 4. Stretch the dough to make it very thin and translucent.
- 5. Transfer dough to the pan, flatten any crumpled areas, and cut off thick bundles
- 6. Place bananas in the center and fold dough over to make a
- 7. Sear both sides until golden, add butter for crispiness.
- 8. Cut into smaller squares and serve with condensed milk. Enjoy warm for the best experience!

INTERNATIONAL EVENTS

The Rotary Peace Conference in Istanbul (Feb 20-22) focused on "Healing in a Divided World." Rotary International President Stephanie A. Urchick emphasized that peacebuilding requires long-term commitment and collaboration.

Sessions explored technology's role in peace and conflict, highlighting both Al-driven peace efforts and the threat of misinformation. PeaceTech Lab founder Sheldon Himelfarb warned that misinformation is an existential threat comparable to war and climate change.

Environmental challenges were another key focus. Nada El Agizy stressed that climate change threatens the Arab region, while Yana Abu Taleb of EcoPeace Middle East argued that sustainable peace in the region is impossible without environmental protection.

A powerful moment came from Freddy Mutanguha, a survivor of the 1994 Rwandan Genocide, who dedicated his life to preventing atrocities and fostering peace.

The conference also introduced the first Rotary Peace Fellows at the new Otto and Fran Walter Rotary Peace Center in Istanbul, offering leaders from the Middle East and North Africa training in peace and development. Their projects range from refugee support to youth education.

Urchick concluded by urging participants to forge partnerships, emphasizing that peace requires collaboration between governments, NGOs, and communities to create lasting impact.
